

INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with a C. L. Berger mining transit No. 4270. The courses were deflected from the true meridian as determined by observation on Polaris at western elongation. The distances were measured with 100-ft. and 500-ft. steel tapes.

REPORT.

The lode line of each location of this claim was run directly upon the ground, and the several corners established by means of offsets from the lode lines. All tie lines were run either directly upon the ground, or by traverses, run upon the ground and reported in a separate report herewith.

The S. W. Cor. Sec. 5, T. 26 S., R. 65 E., M.D.M., is a granite or monzonite rock, 7¹⁰×12¹⁶×14 ins., set in a mound of rock, chiseled 5 notches E. and 5 notches S. This is the nearest standing corner of the public survey that can be found and identified. At N.5°10'W. 115.83 ft. from this corner, there is another monument, consisting of a granite or monzonite rock 6×12×12 ins., set in a mound of rock, chiseled 5 notches and TXXVIS RLXV, all on the S. face, but I have strong grounds for believing that this monument is a spurious corner, and that it was established in the fall of 1906 by a surveyor who made a preliminary survey on these claims at that time. The monument hereinbefore described as the true corner answers the description given in the field notes of the public land survey, and agrees in its position with the various calls to gulches and other adjacent topography as reported in said field notes, while this last described monument does not so agree.

I find the line between Secs. 6 and 7, T. 26 S., R. 65 E., M.D.M., to be S.87°32'W. 4934.1 ft., instead of N.89°56'W. 78.19 chains, as reported in the field notes of the public land survey.

Note;-- The discrepancies between these field notes and the several certificates of location are due to errors in said certificates. A preliminary survey was made upon these lodes in the fall of 1906, and the boundaries marked with pine posts as shown herein. This survey is identical with the several locations as found staked upon the ground.
