

Chains

Beginning at Cor. No. 1, identical with Cor. H-3 of the listing survey, a stone marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General, in place of which I set an aspen post, 3 ft. long, 4 ins. sq., 24 ins. in the ground, over a stone marked with a cross (x), marked 1-HES-69 on side facing the claim, with tack in top for Cor. 1 of this survey; no bearings, therefore dig pits, 24 x 24 x 12 ins., crosswise S. 7° 00' E. and S. 65° 30' W., 7 ft. dist.; and raise a mound of earth and stone, 4 ft. base, 2 ft. high, 3½ ft. dist., within the claim. Fences bear S. 66° 00' W. and S. 10° 00' E.

The cor. of Tps. 46 and 47 N., Rgs. 54 and 55 E., M. D. M., a stone marked with six notches on the N. and S. side, with witness trees to the SE. and SW., properly marked, bears N. 66° 22' E., 153.78 chs. dist., by traverse, computations of which are here- to attached.

I set up at the above described Cor. 1, and at 9 h., A. M., 1. m. t., I set off 41° 52' on the latitude arc, 16° 47' 30" S. on the declination arc, and determine, with the solar, a meridian. Referred to this meridian listing Cor. H-3 of L. S. Eastman's homestead, H. E. S. No. 67, bears N. 9° 14' 30" W., which agrees with the bearing of the same line, re- ferred to the meridian determined by Polaris ob- servation.

Magnetic declination = 19° 10' E.
