A Shaft, the mouth of which bears from Cor. No. 4, $S 57^{\circ} 30' E$, 719.0 f., 5×6 f., 50 f., deep in rock

The foregoing improvements all belong to claimant herein

- Instrument -

This survey was made with a Gurley Light Mountain Transit. The Courses were deflected from the true meridian as determined by direct solar observations. The distances were measured with 100 f., and 500 f., steel tapes

- Report -

The N. E. Cor. of Sec. 12 T. 16 N. R. 62 E., of the Mount Diablo Base and Meridian, is a limestone rock $6 \times 12 \times 9$ ins., in the ground and mound of stone, with one notch on the north and five notches on the south face. This is the nearest public land corner to the claim now standing

Surv. No. 1725 - Rob Roy Lode

Cor. No. 3, is a cedar post, standing 3 f., high, 4 ins. square, in mound of earth and rock, scribed U.S.S. No. 3-1725-L-67

Lot No. 58 - Saxton Lode

Cor. No. 1, is a pine post, sawed, planed and painted red, white and blue, to distinguish the Saxton Corners, it stands 3 f., high in a mound of rock, is firmly set in the ground, 4 ins. square, but is unmarked. This corner was identified by parties well acquainted with the premises, and I was informed, that all the old original posts of the Official Survey of the Saxton, were replaced by posts such as this, as being more durable
