

The distances were measured with with a 400 ft. steel tape and 2.5 ft., tenths scale on transit legs.

NOTE:- The disagreements between these field notes and the location certificates with reference to the directions of lode and boundary lines are due to errors in the latter.

#### Report.

The N.W. Cor. sec. 7, T. 6 S. R. 41 E. M. D. B. and M. is a black phonolite rock .4 x .6 x 1.4 ft. in a mound of stones situate about 500 ft. east of a spring on the east foothills of McGruder mountain. and about 1 1-2 miles S.E. from Lida. Chiseled 5 notches on south and 1 notch on north side.

The N.E. Cor. sec 7 is a stone about .8 x .8 x 1.7 ft. in a mound of rocks, chiseled 5 nothches on one side, the other side notches are not plain. Its identity would not be recognized except for the measurements from the N.W. Cor. and S.E. Cor of said sec 7. I reset said stone in its rock mound and chiseled 5 nothches on the dim side thereof.

I measured the line from the S.E. Cor. said sec 7 north and examined several rocks at 2640 ft. but was unable to positively <sup>identify</sup> the east 1-4 cor, not having the description of the stone. I find one stone in place about 1.2 ft square, which seems to have some chisel marks thereon but these may have been made by miners as there is a deep shaft within a few feet, and several mounds of rock built by miners or prospectors, some of whom may have used the stone unknowingly. I will not report it out as it may yet be identified by the ravine south or rocky ledge north. I therefore use the official course and distance from the N.E. corner.

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
