

2. A shaft which bears from Cor. No.2, S.66° 40' W.490 .ft.  
8 ft. wide, 9 ft. long, 20 ft. deep,

Other Improvements.

- a. An abandoned tunnel, the mouth of which bears from Cor. No.2, S.30° W. 100 ft. 4 ft. wide, 4 ft. high, running west, estimated 50 ft. Dangerous to enter. claimant unknown.
- b. An abandoned tunnel, the mouth of which bears from Cor. No 2, S. 32° W. 160 ft. 3 ft. wide, 4 ft. high running west, estimated 100 ft, dangerous to enter. claimant unknown.
- c. A shaft which bears from Cor. No.1, N.48° 20' W. 490 ft. 3.5 ft. wide, 6 ft. long estimated 80 ft. deep. claimant unknown.
- d. An abandoned tunnel, the mouth of which bears from Cor. No.3, S.19° E. 100 ft. 4 ft. wide. 6 ft. high, running South 20 ft., claimant unknown.
- e. A tunnel, the mouth of which bears from Cor. No. 3. S. 77° E. 600 ft., 4 ft. wide, 6 ft. high running S.60° W. estimated 100 ft. claimant unknown.

REPORT.

The west 1-4 cor. sec. 6. T. 6 S. R. 41 E. is a rhyolite rock in a mound of rock at foot of a bluff, and south of a small ravine and wagon road. Said stone is .4' x .8' x 1.5 ft. marked 1-4. It is at a measured 1-2 mile north from the N. W. Cor. sec 7. T.6 S. R. 41 E. to which I tied sur. No.2702.

The N. W. Cor. sec 6. was not found. The conditions for finding it were not at all good, so I have used the official field notes for course and distance. I have therefore calculated accordingly.
