

No. 3 Military No. 1 lode, N.31°W. 750 ft. 4 ft. wide, 6 ft. deep, 35 ft. long, course S.60°W.

An open cut, the south end of which bears from Cor. No. 3, Military No. 1 lode, N.37°30'W.-350 ft. 4 ft. wide, 5 ft. deep, 100 ft. long, course N.22°W.

Claimants of both unknown.

A frame house, the N.W. Cor. of which bears from Cor. No. 4, Mother Lode Mine lode, S.34°30'E.-670 ft. 16 ft. wide, 40 ft. long, course of long side East and West.

Claimant herein.

INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with a C.L. Berger and Sons No. 2 transit. The courses were deflected from the true meridian as determined by direct solar observations. The distances were measured with 100 and 500 ft. steel tapes.

REPORT.

All lines and ties in this Survey were run direct upon the ground.

The Cor. to Secs. 7 and 18, 12 and 13 T.16N. R.61E. and 62E. M.D.B. and M., to which connections are given in this Survey, is a lime rock 6 x 14 x 12 ins. above ground, with two notches on the north side and four notches on the south side. This is the nearest standing corner of the Public Survey that can be found and identified.

Sur. No. 2218, Easter and Sam Long lodes:

All of the corners are pine posts properly set and scribed with the initial of the name and number of the corner and Survey.

Survey No. 2512, Calker No. 1, Calker No. 2 and Elk lodes:

All of the corners are pine posts properly set and scribed with the initial of the name and the number of the corner and survey.

I find line 12-3, Calker No. 1 lode, to be N.11°31' W.-1489.93 ft. instead of N.11°34' W.-1490.90 ft. as approved. I also find lines 1-2 and 3-4, Calker No. 2 lode. to
