

A frame building, the west corner of which bears from Cor. No. 2, Penrod No. 5 lode, S. 23° 41' E., 271.5 ft., 18 x 21.5 ft., course of long sides, S. 31° W., claimant herein.

An old cut, the toe of which bears from Cor. No. 1, Penrod No. 6 lode, N. 37° 51' E., 717 ft., 3.5 ft. wide, running N. 41° W., 70 ft. to 11 ft. face, claimant unknown.

An old pit, the center of which bears from Cor. No. 1, Penrod No. 6 lode, N. 37° 26' E., 868 ft., 12 ft. in diameter, 12 ft. deep, caved below, claimant unknown.

INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with a Buff and Buff, Model 25 transit, No. 10482. The courses were deflected from the true meridian as determined by direct solar observations.

The distances were measured with 500 ft. and 5 ft. steel tapes.

R E P O R T .

The boundaries of each location of this claim were run directly upon the ground.

All tie lines were run either directly upon the ground or by traverses, run upon the ground.

The closing corner of Sec. 1 and 12, T. 44 N., R. 55 E., M. D. B. & M., on the Ruby Valley Guide Meridian is a rhyolite rock, 8 x 8 ins., 8 ins. out of a mound of stone with mound of stone alongside, chiseled with 1 notch on the north face and 5 notches on the south face, and C C on the west face.

The $\frac{1}{4}$ corner between Secs. 1 and 12, T. 44 N., R. 55 E., M. D. B. & M., is a quartz rock 6 x 10 ins., 6 ins. above ground, properly set and witnessed, chiseled $\frac{1}{4}$ on the north face.
