INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with a C. L. Berger Mining Transit No. 3246. The course were deflected from the true meridian as determined by an observation on Polaris. The distances were measured with a 660 ft. and 6 ft. steel tapes.

REPORT.

The S ¼ Cor. Sec. 14, T 29 N, R 46 E, M.D.M. is a quartzite stone, 7 x 10 x 21 ins., set in a mound of rock and chiseled with 1/4 on its north face. This is the nearest standing corner of the public survey that could be found and identified.
