

A stone and adobe house, the SE. corner of which bears from Cor. No. 6, Long Chance No. 4 lode, N. 0° 51' W., 499.8 ft., 12.4 x 15.5 ft., course of long sides, N. 3° E., Marion Dubois, claimant.

A frame and stone house, the SW. corner of which bears from Cor. No. 6, Long Chance No. 4 lode, N. 2° 54' W., 536 ft., 16 x 22.3 ft., course of long sides S. 87° E., Marion Dubois, claimant.

INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with a Buff & Buff, Model 25, transit, No. 10482. The courses were deflected from the true meridian as determined by direct solar observations. The distances were measured with 500-ft. and 5-ft. steel tapes.

REPORT.

The boundaries of each location were run directly upon the ground. All tie lines were run directly upon the ground or by traverse, run upon the ground.

The corner to Secs. 16, 17, 20 and 21, T. 39 N., R. 46 E., M. D. M., is a rhyolite rock, 12 x 12 ins., 12 ins. out of a mound of stone, chiseled with 4 notches on the east side and 3 notches on the south side.

The $\frac{1}{4}$ corner between Secs. 17 and 20, T. 39 N., R. 46 E., M. D. M., is a rhyolite rock, 6 x 10 ins., 12 ins. out of a mound of rock, chiseled $\frac{1}{4}$ on the north face.

These are the nearest corners of the Public Land surveys.

I find the $E\frac{1}{2}$ of the line between Secs. 17 and 20 to run N. 89° 49' W. from the Section corner instead of west, as approved.

Sur. No. 4192, Water Witch No. 2 lode:-

Corners 1 and 2 are pine posts properly set and scribed with initials and number of the lode and number of the corner and survey.
