- 15.50 A spur, slopes NW.; descend 185 ft.
 - 34.20 A wash, 2 chs. wide, course SW.; ascend 6 ft.
 - 39.42 The orig. stan. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., which is a granite stone, 14x12x10 ins., set in a mound of stone 2 ft. base and 1 ft. high and marked $\frac{1}{4}$ on N. side. In place of stone cor., which is deposited alongside,
Set an iron post $\frac{3}{4}$ ft. long 1 in. diam., 16 ins. in the ground to bedrock, and in a mound of stone to top, for stan. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., with brass cap marked

 - 27.20 A ravine, course SW.; ascend 100 ft.
 - 36.30 A ridge-spur, slopes SW.; descend 65 ft. on NW. slope.
 - 40.30 The stan. cor. of secs. 31 and 32.
Land, mountainous.

North on a random line bet. secs. 31 and 36.

- 39.16 A point 36 lks. W. of the orig. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.
- 79.02 A point 172 lks. W. of the orig. cor. of secs. 25, 30, 31 and 36; a mesquite stake 2 ins. sq., 40 ins. long, lying on a mound of stone 3 ft. base and 2 ft. high and marked TXXVIIIIS, SXXX on NE., SXXXVI on SE., SXXXV on NW. and marks on SW. side are not legible.
At point for cor.
Set an iron post $\frac{3}{4}$ ft. long 2 ins. diam., 27 ins. in the ground, with the original stake set alongside, for cor. of secs. 25, 30, 31 and 36, with brass cap mkd.
