GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This township consists of rolling and broken mountainous land. The soil ranges from a sandy loam to a rocky, stony nature. The northeastern portion contains exceptionally good grazing land. Fox Canyon contains springs of water. The southwestern portion is only fair grazing land, there being no places for stock to water except at Pyramid Lake.

The north end of Pyramid lake comprises a small portion of secs. 23, 34 and 35.

A very low pass extends from the north end of Pyramid Lake to the northwest corner of the township. A railroad could obtain a low grade through this pass.
