GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The land in this township is rolling and mountainous. Along the shore of Pyramid Lake, which forms the east and south boundaries of the township, the land is rolling and covered with scattered brush and bunch grass, and is suitable for grazing purposes. The soil is sandy.

The mountainous portion of the township is barren, and the soil rocky. A wagon road follows the shore of Pyramid Lake. Anaho Island (or Thunder Island) contains

about 240 acres and is located in sec. 16. The island is mountainous and barren. The soil is rocky. The Island is one of the few nesting places for pelicans.

Fremont's Pyramid, located in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 3, gets its name from its shape. It is about 250 feet high, and nearly a geometrical pyramid, breaking off in vertical slopes at water's edge. It is impossible to ascend or even land a boat on it.
