

Walker River Indian Reservation.

As the boundaries of the Walker River Indian Reservation were never run in the field, the courses and distances thereof, having been ascertained by triangulation, and as the Reservation lies partly within Tps. 8 N, Rs. 29 and 30 E, Mount Diablo Meridian, find it necessary before surveying these Tps. to establish the boundaries of said Reservation, in order to connect the lines of the Public Surveys therewith.

Being unable, after diligent search, to find corner marked N.R.P.R. No. 1, Start at Stone mound, identified by settlers as Corner No. 15, and run, on a random line, to a point, 80 lks. West of old corner, same being a Stone, 16 x 14 x 10, in Stone mound; I mark same for Corner No. 1 to Walker River Indian Reservation, from which corner, run on a true line
