GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This township is composed of broken mesas which are stony and rocky, and the soil would all be classed as third and fourth rate, stony.

Between the most prominent rims, one of which runs SW. through sections 13, 23, 24, 26, 27 and 33, and the other SW. through sections 25, ^{26, 34} and 35, there is found an abundance of good grass, excellent for grazing. Above and on top of these rims is a rocky sage brush flat with some scattered grass.

There is no timber or undergrowth of any kind.

There are no settlers, the township being entirely arid, and only useful for grazing purposes.
