GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The topography in this township varies from a gently
rolling plateau, to that of a broken mesa, there being a
prominent rim running northwest through sections 36, 35, 26
and 27, and west through sections 21 and 23.

The soil can nearly all be classed as third rate, stony,
except along the rim, which is rocky, entirely barren and
fourth rate stony.

There is no timber of any kind in this township. The en-
tire township is covered with a good growth of grass and
some scattered low sage brush, which makes it very suit-
able for grazing.

Except for a small spring about 10.00 chs. East of the
1/4 sec. cor. bet. secs. 23 and 26, the township is arid.

There are no settlers in this township, the land being
too rocky to farm and too high to irrigate. It is useful
only for grazing land.
