

General Description.

This Township consists mainly of low flat ridges, general course South, separated by shallow draws or valleys.

The soil is a sandy loam and in the valleys is first class. It is entirely covered with a dense growth of sagebrush & greasewood.

There are a few small patches of alkaline land covered with greasewood and eye and bunch grass are found distributed throughout the entire Township.

A ridge extends through sections 4, 9 & 10 with scattering junipers.

The western part of the township is almost level table land.

With irrigation this township would produce abundant crops.

The townships immediately North and W. are abundantly watered by Roberts Creek which could be conveyed to this township by ditches.

The important mining town of Durkina is distant 25 miles in a South Easterly direction.
