for future reference. 36.11 chs. from interior  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  cor. South; and 33.15 chs. E of Standard T. cor.  
but of course, having no field notes of subdivision,  
set no C. C.

On June 19<sup>th</sup> at a point 2.935 ft. S. of  
S. C. T. 41 N. R. 57 & 58 E., in Lat  $41^{\circ} 23' 26''$   
Long.  $115^{\circ} 28' 57''$ . at  $1^{\text{h}} 29^{\text{m}} 84^{\text{s}}$  <sup>(a.m.)</sup> by my watch, which  
is  $2^{\text{m}} 30^{\text{s}}$  slower than local mean time, I observe  
Polaris. at eastern elongation. by methods of record,  
as directed in manual, using short candle ends,  
lighted, to sight. to; bisecting. wick, <sup>(in the morning)</sup> and mark  
mean point. thus determined. by a wire lead  
in a wooden plug, driven in the ground, 5  
chs. N. of my station. In the morning I  
lay off the azimuth of Polaris,  $1^{\circ} 39' 59''.12$ ,  
to W.; and mark point by a cross, <sup>(D) chisel,</sup>  
on a stone, marked "M", securely set in ground  
marked also transit point. but do not find  
its description in my tables. I am sure it  
is a cross. on stone. firmly set in ground.
