GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The two-mile strip of this tp. which I surveyed, is covered with an exceptionally dense growth of timber, consisting of pine, cedar and mahogany. Some of the trees are three feet in diam., though of a scrubby nature. The land, with the exception of secs. 11, the E  $\frac{1}{2}$  of sec. 12 and the E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  of sec. 1, is very rough and mountainous, and adaptable for grazing land only.

There is a possessory claim on line of secs. 26 and 35 in Marysville canon belonging to J. Bowler; also a fence crosses the lines of secs. 1, 2, 11 and 12, and closes the road to Gross Creek canon. The country is well watered.
