 15.50 Ridge, bears N.E. and S.W. Descend to ravine.

#### General Description.

This township consists almost altogether of high mountains and rolling, grazing land. The only portions under cultivation are about 60 acres in secs. 32 and 33, belonging to the Gerlach Live Stock Company's Clear Creek ranch, this is in orchard, alfalfa and garden; about the same amount in sec. 18 in wild meadow grass. This is irrigated and cut for hay, by the Gerlach Live Stock Company.

Albert Jenkins, squatter in sec. 18, has a couple of acres in garden. Practically all the water available for irrigation is used on the above cultivated lands, but the numerous small streams and springs make it an excellently well watered country for grazing purposes. In the mountains the feed for grazing is exceptionally good.

There are indications of mineralization in the mountains. These indications are strongest in secs. 1, 2, 8 and 9. In secs. 8 and 9 there is copper float and in secs. 1 and 2 the float looks to be gold bearing.

There is no timber of commercial importance, in the moun-
