## GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This township is principally mountainous land, very rough and rocky in most places. There is an abundant growth of Juniper timber on the Western half of the township. The mining town of Olinghouse is situated in sec. 29. A portion of the town extending into sec. 30

There are hundreds of mining claims staked and being developed throughout the entire township. The principal districts being in secs. 15, 19, 20, 21, 29 and 30.

The township contains a number of springs which furnish from 2 to 26 inches of water, and several of the basins, namely, Fort Defiance, Olinghouse, and Jones canons, afford good grazing land for stock. The balance is too rough and dry to be good grazing land.

Nearly the entire township is mineral land.
