

Resurvey of Subdivisions of T. 22 N. R 23 E.

Chains.

69.30 Draw, course NE.

78.00 Ridge, bears NE and SW.

79.85 Set an andesite stone, 20x8x6 ins. 15 ins. in the ground for closing cor. of secs. 33 and 34, marked CC on S. with 3 grooves on the E. and W. faces; from which

A cedar 10 ins. dia. bears S. 73o E. 65 lks dist. marked T 22 N R 23 E S 34 B T.

A cedar 8 ins. dia bears S 85o 15' W. 101 lks : dist. marked T 22 N. R 23 E. S 33 B T.

I now change the marks and witnesses on the cor of secs. 27, 28, 33 and 34, to refer to secs 27 and 28 only.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, stony, 3rd. rate.

Timber, cedar and sagebrush.

Mountainous land, 79.85 chs.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The portion of this township surveyed by me is entirely mountainous and very rough. The greater portion of it is covered with a heavy growth of small cedar timber, suitable for fuel and mine timbers.

There are a number of mines located in different parts of the township. The northern part being the principal mining district, in the vicinity of Coal, Big Mouth and Secret canons.

Secret canon basin is very good range land for stock, as well as, the higher portions of Big Mouth, and Coal canons.

There is a large stream of water flowing in Coal canon, suitable for power or irrigating purposes.

(Note) I destroyed all evidence of the previous erroneous survey made by Deputy Churchill.
