General Description.

This fractional township contains two varieties of land, level and rolling, and the soil ranges from sandy loam to gravelly and rocky. The soil of the bottom lands along the Colorado River is generally sandy loam, evidently made land from overflows of the river, and is capable of producing abundant crops with irrigation. The soil of the remaining portion of the township is gravelly and rocky and is of an arid character, no grasses of any kind growing upon it. None of the rolling lands can be classed as agricultural.

Scattering cottonwood and willow timber and dense underbrush is found in the bottom lands.

The township is watered on the east portion thereof by the Colorado River. I was informed by the old settlers that, in places, the river has changed its right bank over half a mile to the west, and it looks as though it were apt to continue washing away the right bank till most of the agricultural land in this Tp. is destroyed.

Alfred Bley has two cabins, a windmill, and pump in sec. 6. He cultivates a portion of the S. W. 1/4 of sec. 6, S. W. 1/4 of sec. 7 and N. W. 1/4 of sec. 18. About 100 acres in all. Value of his improvements is about \$3000.

Helia Weaver has a cabin in the S. 1/2 of sec. 18, and pump in sec. 7. She cultivates a portion of the S. 1/2 of sec. 18 and N. E. 1/4 of sec. 19. About 30 acres in all. Value of her improvements is about \$1000.

A. F. Gatewood has a cabin in the N. W. 1/4 of sec. 26, worth about \$50.

No indications of mineral in this township.
