I ran 3 miles N. and S. from my point of intersection, and found no other mile post. I reset same post, 24 ins. in the ground, and raise a mound of stone N. of cor.

N. 6.9 lks. from the tangent.

Point for cor. falls on solid rock.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. diam., 24 ins. in a mound of stone, for standard closing cor. of T. & S., R. 71 E., with brass cap lkd.

General Description.

Through ranges 63 and 64, this line runs across mountainous land, through scattering scrub cedar. Ridges and gulches having a south-easterly trend.

In range 65 it runs, for the most part, through low, level, valley land, having a south-easterly trend. Under irrigation, this valley could produce large crops. It is well covered with nutritious grasses, and many cattle are pastured here. Water can be found only in small springs, but, from all appearances, surface water could be had by boring. The agricultural land, both N. and S. of the line in this range, should be subdivided.

Through ranges 66, 67, 68, 69, 70 and 71, the
