June 2, 1911.

At the closing corner of T 19 N, R 22 and 23 E, reestablished by me (May 31, 1911, at 8 h. a.m., local mean time, I set off $50^{\circ}28'$ on the lat. arc. and $22^{\circ}7'$ N. on the decl. arc. and determine a true meridian with the solar.

Thence I run

West on a blank line.

At 11.45 chs. I find the cor. of T p. 20 N, R 22 and 23 E, a basalt stone, firmly set in the ground; marked, witnessed and of the size described by the Surveyor General.

From this cor. I continue my blank line west,

at 40 chs. I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

At 80 chs. I search diligently but find no cor. for secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36.

at 120 chs. I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

at 161.97 chs. I find the old cor. of secs. 2, 3, 34 and 35, falling 2.16 chs.

South of my line.

This old cor. is a basalt stone 10×8 ins. by 12 ins. above ground, firmly set in the ground, marked with 2 notches on E. and 4 notches on W. edge and witnessed by a small pile of stone W. of cor.

I continue my blank line west at 40 chs. I search diligently but find no old $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

At 81.70 chs. I find the old cor. of secs. 3, 4, 33 and 34 falling 1.02 chs. south of my line.

This old cor. is a basalt stone $22 \times 12 \times 4$ ins. set in a mound of stone and marked with 3 notches on E. and W. edges.
