Wholly unfit for cultivation. Fair growth sagebrush, little grass, no timber. No mineral indications. Land of very little value. Slopes S.E.

June 8-1912. In accordance with instructions from the U. S. Surveyor General dated June 3rd 1912, which authorizes me to make certain corrections surveys of the work of Transitman W. A. Pray, I proceed as follows:

I begin at the Cor. of Secs. 4, 5, 8 and 9 established by Transitman Pray, thence I run

N0°01'E between Secs. 4 and 5; descend.

3.50 Bottom of gulch course E. thence ascend along E. slp. of Mt. S. ridge.

37.00 Top of ridge 1000 ft high bears N. N. W. and E. S. E.

40.00 Intersect $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor. established by Transitman Pray. An iron post with brass cap 3 ft long, 1 in dia., set 24 ins. in the ground. Inasmuch as the markings on this corner referred to Secs. 4 and 5, I change them to refer as ~~to~~ to Sec. 4 only, as follows:-

and change the mound of stone 2 ft base, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ft high from the N. to the E. side of corner.

47.16 A point due East of the $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor. on the N. bdy. of Sec 5. Set an iron post 3 ft long, 1 in dia., 24 ins. in the ground for $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor. of Sec 5 with brass cap mkd. 55 $\frac{1}{4}$ 1912; and raise a mound of stone 2 ft base 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ft high W of the Cor.

50.50 Bottom of gulch course W. N. W.

86.79 Intersect the N. bdy. of ~~the~~ ^{the} closing corner to Secs 4 and 5 established by Transitman Pray. Said C.C. is N 89°50' E. 15.09 chs. from the Cor. of Secs. 32 and 33. An iron post 3 ft. long, 1 in dia., set 24 ins in the ground, with brass cap mkd.:-
