

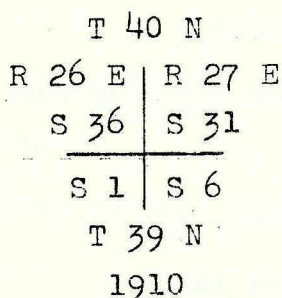
South Boundary T. 40 N., R. 26 E.

Chains

At this cor. he states that he turns off from the meridian an angle of 90° toward the west, and proceeds with the survey of the south boundary of the township.

October 16, 1913: I find the cor. of Ts. 39 and 40 N., Rs. 26 and 27 E., to be an iron post, 3 ins. diam., set on bed rock and firmly set in a mound of stone, with brass cap mkd.

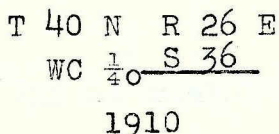

Over mountainous land.

- 0.85 Edge of cliff, bears NE. and SW.; desc.
- 16.00 Bottom of gulch, course S.; asc.
- 31.30 Spur, projects S.; desc. over rocky cliffs.
- 40.00 Face of nearly vertical cliff, 200 ft. high, bears N. and S. Point for $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. falls in inaccessible place.
- 40.62 At the foot of high cliff set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 18 ins. in the ground to bed rock, and in a mound of stone, for witness cor. to $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., with brass cap mkd.

- 42.10 Bottom of gulch, course S.; asc. along S. slope of mountain.
- 54.20 Cliff, 70 ft. high, bears N. and S.
- 58.50 Desc. along S. slope of mountain.
- 80.00 Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, for cor. of secs. 35 and 36, with brass cap
