

Meander of south end of Summit Lake.

I commence on the E. shore of the lake, at meander cor. of fracl. sec. 6, and 31, on N. bdy. of township, heretofore described in book of exteriors.

(Note: As the sky was overcast the entire night of Dec. 1, 1910, Polaris not visible.)

I proceed as follows:

December 2, 1910: At 8 h A.M., I set my transit up over meander cor. on E. shore of lake, N. bdy. of township and foresight to meander cor. on W. shore of lake, N. bdy. of township, which bears S.89°33'W.

At this meander cor. I turn 89°33' from west to south and run with meanders in sec. 6.

Along gravelly beach, through low sage brush.

#### GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The land in this township consists of high rugged mountains and deep rocky gulches.

Bunch grass grows abundantly. Several creeks and small springs are in different portions of this township. The soil is rich along the creeks, but there is not much of it, and in general is only adapted for grazing purposes. Small groves of quaking asp and mountain mahogany are scattered generally over the township, and especially along the creeks.
