

² Retracement of lines E. of sec. 1 and 12; S. of
 Secs. 1, 2 and 3, and E. and S. of sec. 10 in T33N, R40E

I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. I return to the temp cor. of secs. 2, 3, 10 and 11 and run W. on a blank line retracing the S. bdy. of sec. 3. At 40 chs. I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. At 80.35 chs. I find the cor. of secs. 3, 4, 9 and 10 at 2.67 chs. N. of my line. This cor. is a cottonwood stake 2 ins. diam., 2 ft. above ground, firmly set in the ground in an old mound of earth. The markings are so nearly obliterated as to be undecipherable.

From this cor. I run S. on a blank line, retracing the line bet. secs. 9 and 10. At 40 chs. I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. At 80 chs. I find the cor. of secs. 9, 10, 15 and 16. This cor. is a cottonwood stake 2 ins. diam., 2 ft. above ground. Firmly set in the ground in an old mound of earth. The markings are so nearly obliterated as to be undecipherable.

From this cor. I run E. on a blank line, retracing the line bet. secs. 10 and 15. At 40 chs. I search diligently but find no $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

Nov. 21, 1910. At 8 h. a.m., local mean time, I set off $49^{\circ}20'$ on the lat. arc. and $19^{\circ}45'$ S. on the decl. arc. and determine the true meridian at the cor. of Secs. 3, 4, 33 and 34 on the S. bdy. of the tp. This cor. is a cedar stake 2 ins. diam., 2 ft. above ground, firmly set in the ground in a mound of earth of stone. The markings are so nearly obliterated as to be undecipherable.

I now run C. on a blank line retracing the S. bdy. of sec. 34. At 40 chs. I search diligently but find
