

General Description.

The portion of this tp. embraced in this survey is secs. 3, 4, 5 and 9.

Secs. 3, 4 and 9 is rolling land, with a soil ranging from gravelly loam to rocky. Portions of it is level enough and the soil rich enough to be very productive if it could be irrigated but there is no water available for this purpose. It is possible that dry farming might succeed over limited areas, but I do not think it probable. Sec. 5 is mountainous, the mountains consist of lime, granite and eruptive rocks. It is well mineralized, especially the western portion. There is several strong dikes and veins outcropping. Lead and silver seem to be the predominating minerals.
