I destroy all traces of this corner and its accessories and re-establish it at the same point as follows:

Set a limestone $16 \times 8 \times 5$ ins.; 12 ins. in the ground for cor. of secs. 3, 4, 33 and 34; marked with 3 notches on E. and W. edges; and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base, $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high W. of cor.

Land, rolling.

Soil, gravelly to rocky, 2nd. to 4th. rate.

Covered with sagebrush, little grass, no timber. On E. 40 chs. there are many claims located and many prospect holes. Good mineral indications. Slopes westerly.

At the closing tp. corner. of Tps. 32 and 33 N., R42E, at 8 h. a.m., local mean time, I set off $49^{\circ} 20'$ N. on the lat. arc, $13^{\circ} 57'$ N. on the decl. arc, and determine a true meridian with the solar.
