

Subdivision of T. 5 S., R. 44 E.

General Description

This township is almost entirely mountainous, being traversed by deep cañons and steep ridges. A small portion on the east side is rolling. The entire S. western part, which is not subdivided, is extremely rough and mountainous.

The soil ranges from gravelly to rocky. No part of the entire township can be classed as agricultural.

Scattering scrub cedar and piñon pine is found throughout most of the township.

On the highest part of the mountain, in the S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 15, is a monument, 4 ft. in diam., 6 ft. high, built of rocks. This monument looks as though it might have been built for a signal or elevation station for the U. S. Topographical Survey.

Water is found in a few springs in the N. Western part of the township.

There are indications of mineral to be seen in the two first tiers of sections on the north.

The only settler is J. H. Bush, who has a lumber cabin, about 10 x 12 ft., and about 4 acres of land fenced in, 2 acres of which are under cultivation. His improvements are worth about \$250.
