## East Half of Township:

Land is rolling, nearly level in the west and southwest portions, becoming quite hilly in the northeast

part.

The northeast portion contains dense timber of pinon pine, juniper or cedar and mountain mahogany. There is no timber in the west and southwest portions, but there are patches of dense timber on the east portion. There is very little grass, and no water. The soil is very dry and supports a heavy growth of sage and shadscale brush.

There is a general slope southwest to Clover Valley with mountains to the north and east. The soil is sand, clay and gravel, made up of decomposed rock, mostly quartzite and limestone, which is quite rocky. There are many solid outcrops of limestone, quartzite and volcanic rock in the north and northeast portions. The draws are mostly alluvial of fine, sandy loam, the washes showing coarse gravel and stones of quartzite and limestone.

The Western Pacific R.R. and Bell Long Distance Telephone line cross this fractional township. There are no settlers nor mineral in the township. The timber is valuable for fence posts, cordwood and charcoal.

## Northwest Fraction of Township:

Land is level and mountainous. Bew's and Schore's ranches take up the level portion. The soil is gravelly loam with much humous, is very rich and well watered, and raises abundant crops of alfalfa, timothy, the hardy small grains and potatoes. This year it produced an abundant crop of apples and small berries.

The mountains are very rocky, with many solid outcrops of limestone and quartzite, and furnish good grazing land for cattle, horses and deer. There are some iron

outcroppings with traces of lead and copper.

There is timber of mountain mahogany, juniper and pinon pine with aspens along the creeks; also heavy sage, buck and service berry brush.

The main road through Clover Valley with a Farmer's Telephone Line following the same, crosses this fraction. There are high mountains to the west. The creeks

contain many trout.
