Set a volcanic stone 19x7x7 ins., 14 ins. in the ground 40.00 for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., referring to sec. 35, mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ on N. face, and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base, $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high, N. of cor. Iron post impracticable. A gulch, dry, course S., ascend 240 ft. on NW. slope to 50.70 corner. Top of ascent. 80.00 Set a basalt stone 16x14x7 ins., l1 ins. in the ground for the cor. of secs. 35 and 36, mkd. with 1 groove on the E. and 5 grooves on the W. face, and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base, $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high, N. of cor. The W. 27 chs. of this mile lies on a gently rolling mountain top with a very stony soil and almost no vegetation except for a few scattering mahogany trees on the ridge at 21 chs. There are patches of heavy sage in many places on the mile. No timber. October 30, 1914. GENERAL DESCRIPTION. The land traversed by these lines is nearly all moun-

tainous. The western end of the boundary is on a NE. slope and the eastern end in rough breaks. There is a low pass near the middle of the line. The soil of the
