determine a meridian with the solar; thence I retrace

East bet.secs. 6 and 31, and at

47.74 Intersect $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., which is a slate stone 4 X/4 X 10 ins. above ground and marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General. I continue my line east and at

87.74 Intersect cor. of secs. 5, 6, 31 and 32 which is a trap rock, 12 X 12 X 4 ins. above ground and marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General

I continue east on this line and find all of the $\frac{1}{4}$ and sec. cors at intervals of 40.00 and 80.00 chs.,

in exceptional good alinement and marked and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General and at

487.74 Intersect Cor. of Tps. 24 and 25 N., Rs. 32 and 33 E.

which is an earth mound 4 ft. base, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. high, but no evidence of marked post or stone; therefore, on N. side of mound

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. in diam., 24 ins. in the ground for cor. of Tps. 24 and 25 N., Rs. 32 and 33 E., with a brass cap, marked
