GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township is located on the summit of the East Humboldt range of mountains. It is exceptionally rough and mountainous. The summit of the range extends in a northerly and southerly direction along the E. part of the township and averages about 6000 ft. in altitude, while the valley of the Humboldt river, 3 miles to the west is approximately 4000 ft. The surface is much cut up by gullies, washes and small canons, due to frequent cloud bursts that occur in the summer months. There is very little soil, the surface being covered with loose lava boulders and slide rock. Vegetation is limited to low scattering rabbit brush and some sage brush in the bottoms of the washes. A well traveled road crosses the northern tier of sections from east to west, passing over the summit of the range in sec. 1, the only low pass in the township. Muckleberry spring is near the road in the N. E. cor of sec. 2, containing good water in small quantities. There are outcroppings and indications of iron, also a little water of poor quality in sec. 34. The whole of the fracl. township would be classified as low grade mineral lands.
