

Retracement of E. bdy. T 14 N., R. 26 E.

Chains

July 17, 1913: At 8^h. 10^m. a.m., L.M.T. I set off $39^{\circ} 1' N.$ on the lat. arc; $21^{\circ} 15' N.$ on the decl. arc; and determine a meridian with the solar at the cor. of Tps. 13 and 14 N., R. 26 and 27, E. latitude $39^{\circ} 1' N.$ longitude $119^{\circ} 0' W.$

Cor. described in field note of T. 13 N., R. 26 E.

Thence I retrace north on east boundary bet. secs. 31 and 36; at 40.43 Chs. I find the old $\frac{1}{4}$ cor. of secs. 31 and 36 E. 30 lbs. dist.; and at 81.18 Chs. the old cor. of secs. 25, 30, 31 and 36 bears E. 66 lbs. dist., therefore I continue my line north finding the old Cors. out of alignment and at 234.10 Chs. intersect E. and W. line 1.85 Chs. W. of the closing cor. of secs. 18 and 19, T 14 N., R. 27 E., which is a porphyry stone $8 \times 10 \times 14$ ins. above ground, mkd. and witnessed as described by the Surveyor General. I continue my line north and at 242.02 Chs. intersect E. and W. line 1.85 Chs. west of the cor. of secs. 13 and 24, which is a cedar post $4 \times 4 \times 12$ ins. above ground, marked and witnessed for secs. 13 and 24 as described by the Surveyor General.

As subdivisional lines have been closed upon the northern portion of this boundary I retrace north from the cor. of secs. 13 and 24 on E. bdy. sec. 13.
