General Description.

The northwestern part of this tp., the part subdivided by me, consists of rolling to rough mountains, of lime, granite, quartzite and volcanic rocks. There is no settler and no land suitable for cultivation, it being all too rough and rocky.

If the land were of a suitable nature, it is not likely that much could be raised without irrigation, and there is no water available for this, and apparently no means of getting it.

The value of this land lies in its being used for grazing; it is very good grazing land, as desert lands go, there being some grass, and considerable amounts of sagebrush and other herbage.

It is sufficiently well watered for grazing purposes.

There is a scattering to thick growth of juniper, scrub pine and mahogany trees, but this is of little value, as it is too small and scrubby to be of much good for anything except firewood or fence posts.

There is some mineral indications, there being more or less quartz float scattered over the hills.
