

Chains. N. of cor.

The true course of this line is therefore $S.89^{\circ}34'W.$

From the above cor., I continue retracing east but fail to find any old $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. or sec. cors., until at 159.66 Fall 61 lks. N. of the cor. to Tps. 34 and 35 N., Rs. 45 and 46 E., which is a willow stake, showing 14 ins. above ground, set in a small mound of earth, with markings undecipherable. No pits in evidence.

I reestablish the cor. at this point as follows:

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. in diam., 24 ins. in the ground, for the cor. of Tps. 34 and 35 N., Rs. 45 and 46 E., with brass cap mkd.;

The course of this line is therefore $N.89^{\circ}47'W.$

From the above cor., I resurvey west setting cors. at the proportional distances,

38.15 Top of spur, nose bears $S.85^{\circ}W.$; descend.

39.91 Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. in diam., on bed rock, in mound of stone, for $\frac{1}{4}$ cor. to secs. 1 and 36, with brass cap mkd.;
