GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The eastern part of this tp. is rolling ridges and ravines with ageneral easterly and westerly direction. The land has a general easterly slope, from the higher mountains to the west. The surface is thickly sprinkled, in some places being fairly covered, with loose rock from the higher mountains to the west. The soil is derived from the disintegration of volcanic rocks, is not very deep, contains much gravel, and is quite dry. It is not probable that anything much could be raised without irrigation and it is not apparent where the water to irrigate it could be obtained.

The central and western parts of the tp. are high; rolling to rough, volcanic mountains. Very rocky, there being many ledges outcropping, and many small cliffs, much loose rock, and patches of slide. Nearly all the rock is of volcanic origin.

In secs. 15, 22 and 31; there has been a number of lode mining claims located, and a good bit of work done in the way of prospect holes, tunnels and shafts. There is considerable float in these sections, and other mineral indications, such as outcropping veins and so on. Along Corral Canyon which runs easterly through secs. 31,32, 33 and 34; there has been a number of placer claims located, and work done on placer diggings along this canyon.

This tp. is a rather poor grazing country, it being of a dry character, and the grass not growing to much size. Also it is too rocky to be much good for cattle, horses would get along better in dit.

There is water sufficient for stock in Corral Canyon in sec. 31; and in Fire creek in sec. 22.
