

## Subdivision of T.35 N., R. 61 E.

## Chains

- Thence S.89°50'W. on a true line between secs. 4 and 9. Through heavy and dense aspen timber.
- 2.00 Leave aspen timber, bears N. and S. Ascend through dense chaparral.
- 31.00 Top of spur, 715 ft. above sec. cor., bears SE. Enter dense mountain mahogany timber, bears with spur.
- 39.50 Little draw, 50 ft. below spur, course S.30°E. Thence through scattering mahogany timber, and dense chaparral.
- 40.03 Set a granite stone 16x8x6 ins., 10 ins. in the ground, 20 ft. above draw, for the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  on N. face, and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ft. high N. of cor.
- 40.30 Little spur, 10 ft. above  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor., bears SE.
- 49.70 Creek from west, 6 lks. wide, 5 ins. deep, course S.60°E. 55 ft. above spur. Continue ascent along creek, crossing same frequently, through very dense aspen timber with very dense undergrowth and scattering fir and mahogany timber. Frequent small beaver dams along creek.
- 76.00 Creek entering from slightly SW., course practically E.
- 80.07 The cor. of secs. 4, 5, 8 and 9. 250 ft. above creek at 49.70 chain point.
- Land mountainous.
- Soil along creek is rich, black loam, several feet deep; moist. Many huge boulders E. of creek, less loam.
- Soil is sand and gravel with many rocks. Subsoil same.
- Granite and quartzite.
- Timber, aspen, fir and mountain mahogany. Undergrowth, chaparral, sagebrush, willows and choke cherry.
- Good growth of grass.

Sept. 11, 1915.

Sept. 8, 1915:

- N.0°10'W. on a true line bet. secs. 4 and 5.
- Ascend through dense aspen and willows.
- 3.50 Leave aspen and willows, bear E. and W. Continue through dense chaparral.
- 23.50 Top of ridge, 290 ft. above sec. cor., bears E. Descend through aspen, willows, chaparral and scattering fir.
- 32.00 Small springs flowing from rocks. Water flows NE.
- 40.00 Set a granite stone 24x6x6 ins., 18 ins. in the ground for the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  on W. face, and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ft. high, W. of cor. Corner is set 240 ft. below ridge.
- 42.90 Bottom of canyon, 10 ft. below  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor., with small creek 2 lks. wide, 2 ins. deep, course S.80°E.
- 47.90 Leave timber, bears E. and W. Ascend very steep S. slope through patches of very dense chaparral.
- 72.80 Top of ridge, 1025 ft. above creek, projects S.80°E. Thence over very rocky E. slope with less undergrowth and scattering scrub fir trees.
- 81.00 Head of draw, 85 ft. below ridge, course S.80°E.
- 82.23 Intersect N. Bdy. of Tp., 254 lks. E. of the cor. of secs. 32 and 33, T.36 N., R. 61 E. On same elevation as head of draw.

At point of intersection, set a granite stone 24x10x6 ins., 18 ins. in the ground, for the closing corner of secs. 4 and 5, marked with C.C. on S. face, 2 notches on W. and 4 notches on E. edges, and raise a mound of stone 2 ft. base,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ft. high, S. of cor.

Land rough mountainous.

Soil is sand and gravel with a little loam, from a few inches to several feet deep. All very rocky. Many solid outcrops and huge boulders of granite.

Timber, aspen, mountain mahogany and fir.

Undergrowth, chaparral, willows, choke cherry and sage brush. Good growth of grass.
