This township is located on the west slope of Mt. Baldy in the To-ya-be range. It is about ten miles east of the Reese river. The east side is high, and is covered with an abundant growth grass, and is one of the best cattle ranges in Nevada. The west side is lower and contains some good farm land.

There are two creeks that rise within the town ship, in secs. 14 and 21, springs are also found in secs. 22, 24, 26 and 27, which furnish water for the Cronin ranch. Springs are also found in secs. 35 and 36, which form the head waters of Italian creek.

Pinon pine and cedar are found all over the township, except in the north side. Willows grow along the banks of the creeks and mahoganys are found in the higher altitudes. The timber is of value for fuel and fence posts.

Sage brush and bunch grass cover the entire township.

The soil is a clay loam and rocky, generally 3rd rate,
and varies from 6 to 18 ins. deep. The subsoil is a hard
clay and is generally mixed with limestone or gravel.

Miss Mary Cronin has lived on a ranch in secs. 22, 23,
26 and 27, for about 35 years. She has about 60 acres
of ground that has been under cultivation, and at
present is in meadow hay.

Mr. James Watt has an alfalfa field of about 100 acres located in secs. 8, 9, 16 and 17.

Mrs. I. L. Watt's place is located in secs. 17, 18 and 19. There is a large area under fence used for grazing that comprises all of secs. 9 and 17 and parts of secs. 3, 4, 7, 8, 10, 15, 16, 20 and 21.

There is some good farm land in secs. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 30.

No mineral in commercial quantities has been found within the town ship.
