

The portion of this township surveyed by me, contains nearly every variety of land from nearly level valley to rough mountains, and the soil ranges from deep, loose sandy and rocky to good sandy loam. The soil in the level portion in the SW. corner is generally a sandy loam, with clay subsoil in places. In secs. 15 and 22, is a volcanic mountain, with granite dykes in the north part of sec. 15. On the rolling and hilly portion it is chiefly a deep, loose, dry sand, while in the extreme NE. corner, the formation is chiefly of granite.

Scattering scrub timber of pinon pine and cedars is found in the mountainous portion. The Tp. is covered with a heavy growth of black sage, mesquite, rabbit brush and wild peach brush.

There is no water in the Tp.

Indications of mineral have been found in the mountainous portion of the Tp.

The following settlers are living in the Tp.:

H. Beers, located in the SW. $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 28., improvements consist of good house, barn, fences and approximately 70 acres cleared and plowed; also well, about 25 ft. deep to water.

J.P. Simonis, located in the NW. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 33; improvements consist of good house, barn, well, fences and approximately 60 acres cleared.

F.W. Brundidge, located in the SE. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 33; improvements consist of house, and approximately 20 acres under cultivation.
