

This township contains several varieties of land, namely rough and low rolling mountains, hilly and nearly level; the higher and rough portion, extends along the W. bdy.

The soil, ranges from rocky to gravelly and light, dry sandy loams, on subsoil of rock and hard stiff clay subsoil, close to the surface on the greater portion; can be classed from 4th to 2nd rates. Is covered with a sparse short growth of sage and sheep brush, shadscale and scattering grass.

A small spring of pure water, in the main ravine in sec. 8 is the only water in the Tp. Along this water is a grove of cottonwoods, which is the only timber within the Tp.

The Tp. affords fair grazing during the winter months, being too dry during the summer.

The Goldfield and Tonopah branch of the S.P. Railroad, extends through sec. 2. in a north westerly, and south easterly direction.

There are two settlers in the Tp.; J.B. Carter is located near the N. central part of sec. 2; improvements consist of approximate 40 acres cultivated and under fence, house, well and outbuildings.

A.M. Anger is located in the NE. 1/4 of sec. 11; improvements consist of frame house and about 2 acres under cultivation. No indications of mineral were found in the Tp.
