GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This tp. contains rolling plains in the southern, northern and eastern portions, while along the W. bdy. and in the central parts, are barren, broken mountains, rising to an elevation of approximately 2000 ft. above the plains. The tp. is situated to the E. of East Walker River, is traversed by numerous ravines and washes, draining NW. and SW. into same. The E. bdy. lies at the foot of a high range of mountains to the E., having a northerly and southerly trend, and covered with considerable scrub cedar and pinon timber. The soil is generally a light, dry gravelly and sandy loam, mixed with rocks, on gravel and hard, reddish clay subsoils, and rocky of granite and volcanic formations in the rough portions; can be classed from 2nd to 4th rates.

The tp. contains no timber nor water, and is covered with a scant, short growth of greasewood, sheep brush, shadscale, sage and bunch grass.

Considerable prospecting has been done throughout the mountainous portion, especially in secs. 18,19,20 and 29.

Indications of silver, gold and copper are found.

Near center of sec. 29, is a hoist and inclined shaft, approximately 75 ft. deep. In sec. 20 an inclined shaft is being worked at present.

In the SW. quarter of sec. 31, Mr. Abe Charlebois, has about 40 acres under cultivation and in crop.

There are no settlers living in the tp.

The tp. is used for grazing and mining purposes.
