Chains

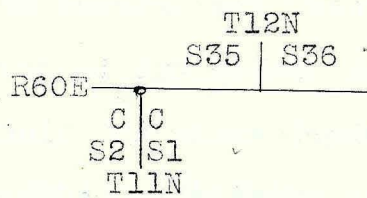
Descend.

76.70 Bottom of ravine, 55 ft. below top of spur, drs, E.

Ascend.

80.28 Intersect N. bdy. of the Tp., 1.27 chs. S.87°09'W. of the cor. of secs. 35 and 36, heretofore described.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. in dia., 24 ins. in the ground for closing cor. of secs. 1 and 2, with brass cap marked

A pinon pine, 12 ins. dia., bears S.10° 50'E., 1.57 chs. dist., marked T 11 N R 60 E S 1 B T.

A cedar, 16 ins. dia., bears S.54° 45'W., 2.22 chs. dist., marked T 11 N R 60 E S 2 B T.

35 ft. above bottom of ravine.

Land, rolling hills of trachyte and red granite formation; general drainage and exposure to the E. and NE.; soil, stony on surface; 4<sup>th</sup> rate; timber, scattering cedars and pinon pine; scattering undergrowth of black sage, yellow top, mountain rush, juniper and bunch grass; fair grazing, 80 chs.
