This township can be divided ,roughly, into two parts of the same general nature ,each; by drawing a line from the N.E. to the S.W. corner. This line will divide the rolling or undulating land, approximately, from the hilly or mountainous land. The northwest part is somewhat rolling or undulating, with a general northerly or north-westerly slope. The soil is dry, rather coarse texture, sandy and gravelly, desert loam soil; derived largely from the disintegration of eruptive rocks. 1st. and 2nd. rate. It is too dry for farming ,without irrigation, and there seems to be only a limited amount of water available for this purpose. There are two settlers in this portion, Floyd Grimes and John Reclusa. There is no timber in this portion of the township.

The southern, eastern and south eastern portion of this township is high, rough mountains; formed largely of eruptive rocks. These mountains slope in general, toward the northwest, and diminish to rolling hills, as they join the rolling land in the N.W. portion of the township. There is but little signs of mineralization in these hills and mountains. There is much timber of juniper, pinon pine and mountain mahogany; intersperced with more or less open places. In times past, there has been much timber cut here and burned for charcoal. This timber is good for firewood, fence posts and for charcoal, but not much else. There are two creeks, Reynolds and Kelly, flowing through the S.E. part of this township, and sinking in the N.W. portion. Geor Williams on Reynolds creek, and Bert Via on Kelly creek, have homesteads under the Forest Service Regulations. Outside of narrow strips of land along these two creeks, there is no land suitable for farming in this part of the township, it being too dry, rocky, steep and gravelly.

There is very fair feed of sagebrush, bushes, browse and some grass, it is better in the hills and mountains than in the flats. This township is fairly well watered for
