

Retracement of Subdivisions of T. 33 N., R. 22 E.

Chains Undergrowth, sagebrush and some bunch grass. No timber.

From the reestablished cor. of secs. 34 and 35.

N. $89^{\circ} 54'$ E. on a true line along the S. bdy. of sec. 35.

Over land sloping west gradually ascend,

9.80 Running stream of spring water, 2 lks. wide, 4 ins. deep,
course S. 80° W.

12.20 Wire fence, bears N., and S. approximately 5 chs. thence
W.; leave cultivated land and enter cleared land.

19.50 Leave cleared ground and ascend slope of mountains.

38.90 Top of spur, 680 ft. above sec. cor., projects S. 45° W.;
descend SE. slope 40 ft. to the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor.

39.96 The old $\frac{1}{4}$ cor. of sec. 35, heretofore described.

Land, W. slope and mountainous with a general exposure to
the W. Soil, Deep brown gravelly loam on W. 20.00 chs.,
clay subsoil; balance of $\frac{1}{2}$ mile has a light brown clay
soil mixed with decomposing granites, loose granite rock
on the surface, exposed outcropping ledges. Undergrowth
sagebrush, bunch grass, some willows. No timber.

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NOTE:- In the retracement of the subdivisional lines in
this township I find a great many of the old cors.,
referred to as charred posts in the old field notes, to
be stone cors. These cors., I believe, were established
at the time of the original survey, but have been errone-
ously described in the field notes. As the relative
positions of these erroneously described cors., one with
another, and with the correctly described cors., is quite
regular; and, as their position on the ground practically
agrees with the recorded items of topography in the old
field notes, I accept the position of these old cors.
as marking the original point for the cor. of the secs.
which they represent.

The old cor. of secs. 15, 16, 21 and 22, which is described
by the surveyor general as a granite stone, 16 X 10 X
6 ins., is found to be a squared juniper post, $1\frac{1}{2}$ ins.
