GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township consists of a high volcanic plateau in the North cut by deep canyons, some of them having perpendicular stone walls. The Southern part of the township is more rolling and with less rock.

The soil in the northern part is very rocky with many rocky cliffs. What soil there is is shallow sand. In the South the soil consists of fine sand and clay, generally shallow and with considerable loose rock on the surface. There is no land that could be cultivated.

There is a scattering growth of mountain mahogany in the rocky northern part of the township and some aspen timber along a few of the gulches.

The undergrowth consists of shadscale and sage, with a scanty growth of bunch grass in the less accessible northern parts. Sheep have pastured off most of the grass.

Springs are located in secs. 2 and 35, the latter being a large well developed one where great numbers of sheep water.

There are no settlers in the township and very few indications of mineral.
