

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF T.18N., R.68 E.

The land of the E. two thirds and a portion of secs. 5, 6, 7, 8, 17 and 18, is mostly rough and broken mountains, and the remaining portion of township is rolling land, sloping W., along the foot of mountains. The divide of the Snake range of mountains crosses the township near the first range line W., and the formation E. of the divide is limestone, and on the W. side the formation is granite and basalt, which forms treacherous cliffs and slides. The lower hills are strewn with boulders from the above formation.

The soil of the township is generally a gray, rocky loam, and is covered with a medium growth of grasses and sagebrush, and is mainly valuable for grazing.

The mountainous portion of township is generally covered with a medium growth of cedar and pinon and scattering fir and scrub mahogany timber.

There were no indications of mineral noted on township.

There is a small stream of water, fed by a number of small springs located in the NE. quarter of sec. 35, flowing through secs. 35, 26 and 27. This stream of water is conducted by a ditch from sec. 27, through secs. 27, 28, 29, 32 and 31, to C. S. Millers ranch and used for domestic and irrigating purposes. There is also a small spring of clear water in the NE. quarter of sec. 22.

C. S. Miller, located on the E. half of sec. 31, is the only settler on this township. Improvements valued at about \$2000.00.
