GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township consists of rough mountains on the west portion, sloping to the flat eastern part of the township. The soil in the mountains is mostly rocky slate, lava and granite, 3rd and 4th rate, that gradually changes to the light sandy loam of the level Paradise Valley. At this time of the year (June), all the mountain canyons have running water that gradually disappears as it flows toward the valley. Cottonwood Creek, in the north, is the only stream that flows thruout the year. Along the streams and in the damp hollows of the high land is a growth of small aspen and cottonwood timber and willows.
